

INTERIM MODERATOR





On 19th October, Nigel and I flew out to Rome, via London to start our wee 30thwedding anniversary present to each other, a cruise around the Mediterranean. We spent our first night in Rome sitting in a lovely streetside restaurant enjoying quintessential cheeses, meats and a chilled glass of wine watching the Italian night life go by. We did take a wee wander and we have to say the Basilica viewed by night is equally as impressive, if not more so, than during the day.

We only had the one full day in Rome so we made the most of it. Our highlights were seeing the Basilica, visiting the Colosseum, getting the obligatory photo with the hundreds of other tourists all jostling for the perfect poise at the Trevi Fountain and taking in the wonders of the Pantheon, especially it's dome. We did not manage to get inside the Colosseum, we should have booked well in advance online, but we will be back.









The next morning we had to head to Civitavecchia port which is 70 km northwest of Rome. This is where we were picking up the boat. Our first day was at sea. We were on the Norwegian Cruise Line ship called The Epic which was carrying 4,100 passengers and a crew of over 1,700. There were many dining options, a variety of entertainment choices including theatre performances, the Cavern Club where a very good Beatles tribute band played, an ice bar (such fun but you needed the cloaks and gloves handed to you before entry!), Casinos, bars and bistros not to mention the upper decks offering clubbing and partying, we were usually in our beds before it all kicked off and were never up on those floors nor in the Casino! We made the most of what the boat had to offer and I even had Nigel playing Bingo and Deal Or No Deal! Amazing what you will do to pass the time when surrounded by sea!

Our first port of call was Santorini. Sailing in seeing the white villages and buildings atop the cliffs was stunning. We were informed that you could walk up the 600 steps to the villages but we were glad of our tour buses. We visited the village of Olia. Pristine white architecture with stark contrasting blue domes took your breath away. We spent time wandering through the narrow streets. There were lots of tourists and cats!



On Tuesday 14th October we were due to dock in Athens. Unfortunately, the tug boats were on strike and so the destination was changed to Mykonos. Myknonos also is a town with whitewashed walls and narrow cobbled streets, similar to Santoroni. However, there was some more contrasting colours as Myknonos has a strict colour code that requires doors to be painted blue, green or red. This dates back to tradition where sailors used to paint their doors blue, farmers painted their doors green and everyone else painted theirs red. Highlights included Kato Milli windmills and Little Venice.



We sailed onwards to Kefalonia and the town of Argustoli. We had not booked a tour here nor did we have to book a tender boat to get us onshore. We were able to walk off the boat and spent a very enjoyable day on foot exploring. We walked out to St Theodore Lighthouse and along the Fanari Peninsula and onwards into the charming town and it's delightful promenade adjacent to the sea. We walked the full length of the De Bosset Bridge which spans over 2,500 feet across the Koutavas Lagoon and is the longest store bridge over the sea in the world.

Our next port of call was Malta and the capital city of Valetta which offered the most stunning Baroque architecture and you could see why it is a UNESCO world heritage site. We very much enjoyed visiting the Grand Master's Palace and strolling down Republic Street. We also took in the smaller city of Mdina which is a tiny walled city formerly the capital. We feel we merely scratched the surface of Malta so it is definitely on our list of places we want to come back to.




Next for us was Scicily. Here we most definitely had the world's most hilarious tour guide! We boarded the bus to head to Taormina and he had us almost convinced that Madonna was a previous participant of one of his tours and stole the lyrics to "Don't Cry for me Argentina" from him with the true lyrics being "Don't Cry for me Taormina". And after stopping for a wine tasting at the Oro d'Etna Winery at 10am it became an almost believable story! On our way to the winery we stopped off to take in the majesty of Mount Etna. Breathtaking and beautiful. Taormina is a beautiful hilltop town and we thoroughly enjoyed its unique side streets, stopping in one such alley way which housed a fabulous little restaurant. The next day we visited Naples and the gorgeous Sorrento, a beautiful city overlooking the Bay of Naples. We also were able to see impressive Mount Vesuvius.





Our penultimate day saw us in Livorno, Italy where we experienced stunning Florence. I can honestly say I have never witnessed a building as beautiful as Duomo Cathedral. Pante Vecchio bridge was picturesque but Florence was akin to Rome in that every corner you turned you were treated to the most amazing architecture and breathtaking buildings and sculptures. I have to say, though, and you will probably not be surprised at this, my favourite was the "Wine Windows". Literally little holes in the wall with little bells that you strike and from there you can order your wine which is delivered through the same hole in the wall!

The second half of this tour was Pisa. We headed to Piazza Del Duomo, another UNESCO World Heritage Site famous for four masterpieces of Medieval Christian architecture, the cathedral, the baptistry of John the Baptiste, the cemetery and the campanite (the leaning tower). Wow, just wow! (Photo 14).





Our last day took us to Cannes in France. It was raining, really raining, non stop, heavy rain, it was most definitely a wet, dreicht day! We were on land around 7:45am and Cannes was shut! However, we walked along the promenade with very expensive hotels and shops and I am sure it looks stunning in the sunshine but I kept wondering when we could head back to the boat! However, despite my sodden feet and inappropriate dress wear Nigel persuaded me to waddle up to the Old Town and we were so glad that we visited the Eglise Notre-Dame d'Esperance, a beautiful old church. We were back on board by 1:30pm and had to pack our cases and leave only an overnight bag. The cases were taken into the disembarkment area ready for us to uplift from the terminal the next morning. I am happy to say that the same taxi firm did turn up this time and we were well on time for our flight to Heathrow. However, the same cannot be said of the actual plane and we landed in Heathrow with only 40 minutes to literally sprint through Terminal 5, get through passport control and through security again. Little did we know that the Aberdeen flight was delayed by an hour! Oh, and our shoes were still wet when we unpacked them in Hatton of Fintray!

A truly fabulous anniversary present. And a great way to see places and get a flavour of what each place has to offer. We have a list of places we want to visit when Nigel retires and it has more than a few destinations now added to it.



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
AUTUMN PUZZLE




SUMMER PATHFINDER ANSWER

AUTUMN RECIPE

Pumpkin Soup

Ingredients

2 tbsp olive oil

2 onions - finely chopped

1kg pumpkin - or squash, peeled, deseeded and chopped into chunks

- 4 carrots
- 4 cloves of garlic
- 700ml vegetable stock or chicken stock

150ml double cream

Method

Heat 2 tbsp olive oil in a large saucepan, then gently cook 2 finely chopped onions and carrots for 5 mins, until soft but not coloured. Add the chopped garlic and cook for a couple of minutes.

Add 1kg pumpkin or squash, cut into chunks, to the pan, then carry on cooking for 8-10 mins, stirring occasionally until it starts to soften and turn golden.

Pour 700ml vegetable or chicken stock into the pan and season with salt and pepper. Bring to the boil, then simmer for 10 mins until the squash is very soft.

Pour 150ml double cream into the pan, bring back to the boil, then purée with a hand blender. For an extra-velvety consistency you can pour the soup through a fine sieve. *The soup can now be frozen for up to 2 months*.

Reheat the soup if needed, taste for seasoning, then serve scattered with croutons and toasted pumpkin seeds and drizzled with more olive oil, if you want.
